A communication template for principals on use of federal relief funds

As federal relief funds flow to districts, principals will want **to engage the school's families and staff about what <u>they</u> see as strategies that will work this year.** Researchers at Georgetown University's Edunomics
Lab worked with Edge Research to learn how district staff, principals, teachers, and parents engage with and react to information about school finance.
